
**Chaplain's Report.** Bob Fleck is still under the weather. We wish him well.



# Veterans sue over VA delay of Blue Water Navy Agent Orange claims

A veterans nonprofit advocacy group has filed a lawsuit asking the court to lift a stay on Blue Water Navy Vietnam veterans' VA claims ordered by the Department of Veterans Affairs Secretary Robert Wilkie.

The lawsuit from Military Veterans Advocacy Inc. was filed in the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals and asks the court to overturn a stay ordered by Wilkie July 1, following President Donald Trump signing the long-awaited Blue Water Vietnam Veterans Act.

The stay effectively stalled the benefits many veterans exposed to Agent Orange thought they had finally gained with the passage of the recent bill after decades of fighting.

The Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) and Board of Veterans Appeals (BVA) were ordered by Wilkie to stay any decisions on claims for disability compensation based on service in the offshore waters of Vietnam beginning Jan. 9, 1962 and ending May 7, 1975, a memo obtained and first reported by Connecting Vets reads.

## Stay Order

The VBA and BVA also "are ordered to stay decisions re-

garding claims for disability compensation that are based on service in or near the Korean Demilitarized Zone" beginning Sept. 1, 1967 and ending Aug. 31, 1971, as well as claims for benefits for spina bifida from children of veterans allegedly exposed to toxic herbicides such as Agent Orange while serving in Thailand from Jan. 9, 1962 to May 7, 1975.

"The stays shall remain in effect until Jan. 1, 2020," Wilkie's memo said.

In his memo, Wilkie said the legislation approved by both chambers of Congress and signed by the President gives him the authority to delay the claims until next year. But the lawsuit says that's not the case, arguing that Congress' intent was for claims to begin being processed before the Jan. 1, 2020 effective date and calling Wilkie's stay an "untimely and unlawful decision."

### Blue water sailors impacted

The lawsuit also addresses the Procopio v. Wilkie Federal Circuit Court decision, which reversed a 1997 VA decision to deny that Blue Water veterans were exposed to the toxic herbicide Agent Orange while serving offshore of Vietnam. The Procopio decision earlier this year meant that the VA should presume veterans who served in the waters off the coast were exposed to Agent Orange at some point during their service, and as a result were eligible for related VA benefits.

The lawsuit says it's likely the VA could interpret Wilkie's stay as precluding all claims related

to Agent Orange exposure, including those under the Procopio decision.

"The VA must abide by the ruling in Procopio and not delay claims," particularly since the court already denied a request for a stay from Wilkie, the lawsuit says. "Now the Secretary has taken it upon himself to usurp the authority of this Court by imposing an illicit and unsanctioned stay of proceedings."

"If there is any basis for a stay," the lawsuit says, "none exists to claims brought under Procopio. ... Procopio claims must be exempted by (VA) to ensure Blue Water Navy veterans receive the benefits they have earned." In the July 5 news release, the VA said Blue Water veterans are "encouraged" to submit their claims for conditions related to Agent Orange. Veterans 85 and older, or "with life-threatening illnesses" will have "priority in claims processing," VA said. But those claims will not be decided until 2020, according to Wilkie's order.

Veterans previously denied an Agent Orange-related presumptive condition can file a new claim under the new law, the VA said. Eligible survivors of deceased Blue Water Navy veterans can also file claims for benefits based on their veterans' service.

The law passed by Congress and signed by the president affects veterans who served on a vessel no more than 12 nautical miles seaward from the demarcation line of the waters of Vietnam and Cambodia, according to VA, about 420,000 to 560,000 Vietnam-era veterans.

Purple Heart recipients, former prisoners of war (POW), and individuals approved and designated as the primary family caregivers of eligible Veterans under the Department of Veterans Affairs Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC) can use commissaries, exchanges, and morale, welfare and recreation (MWR) retail facilities, in-person and online.

# Streak of bad luck for Narco-Subs

(FoxNews.Com) -- The crew of the US Coast Guard Cutter Midgett recently seized more than 4,600 pounds of cocaine, "their second cocaine bust in five days. The total of more than 6,700 lbs. of cocaine were seized in the two operations worth more than \$89 million."

The drugs were confiscated July 31 from a "low-profile go-fast" vessel in

international waters off the Eastern Pacific Ocean, the Coast Guard announced Thursday.

The drug cartels keep trying. Spanish police seized 6,000 lbs. this week during its first-ever 'narco-submarine' capture, believed to be the first ever to enter European waters. "The submarine is believed to have departed from Columbia," Fox reports.

# Vandals accused of flooding USS Ling face charges

Fox News (Hackensack, N.J.) -- New charges were levied against five so-called urban explorers accused of flooding and partially sinking a World War II-era submarine in New Jersey during a pair of break-ins last summer.

Criminal counts of conspiracy and knowingly causing a flood were added on top of the burglary and criminal mischief counts already in place, according to an indictment from July 9, reported by *NorthJersey.com*.

The five individuals, identified as urban explorers (people who visit abandoned structures for fun), were arrested in connection with the alleged vandalism and burglary.

They boarded the 1,500-ton USS Ling in the Hackensack River, opened the underwater hatches and stole four bronze plaques honoring the more than 3,000 Navy officers who died on U.S. submarines during World War II, authorities said. The vessel was flooded, police added.

Artifacts inside the submarine, including radio transmitters, uniforms and textiles, were lost due to water damage. The Ling was the last of a fleet of boats that patrolled U.S. shores during WWII.

The Museum doesn't have the resources to relocate and restore the submarine, which would cost hundreds of thousands of dollars."

# House fly? Elephant fly? Submarine fly?



(Jalopnik.com) -- The Russians were experimenting with submarines that could fly (see photo), but Donald Reid went further:

"In 1961 Donald Reid designed and built a single-seat craft (32.83 ft length) capable of flight and underwater movement. A 65 hp (48 kW) engine mounted on a pylon provided propulsion for flight; a 1 hp electric motor in the tail provided underwater propulsion. The pilot used an aqualung for breathing underwater. The first full-cycle flight [underwater at 6.5 feet (2 m) depth, airborne at 33 ft (10 m) altitude] was demonstrated on 9 June 1964."










# Tolling of the Bells for Lost Boats

"To perpetuate the memory of our shipmates who gave their lives in pursuit of their duties while serving their country. '

November



USS Corvina (SS-226) lost on its first war patrol--just 12 days from the day she left Pearl Harbor.

USS Corvina (SS-226) lost on November 16, 1943 on her 1st war patrol when sunk just south of Truk Island (an atoll hosting a massive Japanese naval and air base) from torpedoes from a Japanese submarine. Loss of 82 crew.

USS Sculpin (SS-191) lost on November 19, 1943 north of Groluk Island near Truk. Severely damaged by depth charges after attacking an enemy convoy, the Sculpin continued to fight on the surface. Due to damage, a decision was made to abandon ship and scuttle Sculpin. The CAPT I.P. Cromwell remained aboard fearing that vital information in his possession might be compromised under torture—he was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor. 41 officers and men were taken prisoner; only 21 survived the war.

USS Albacore (SS-218) lost on November 7, 1944 on her 11th war patrol, when she struck a mine while running submerged in the channel between Hokkaido and Honshu. Loss of 85 crew.

USS Growler (SS-215) lost on November 8, 1944 on her 12th war patrol when sunk while attacking a convoy in the South China Sea. Loss of 85 crew.

USS Scamp (SS-277) lost on November 16, 1944 on her 8th war patrol. when it was sunk off Inubo Saki near Tokyo Bay. She may have been damaged by a mine prior to her loss, since she was trailing oil. This leak helped Japanese coast defense vessels locate her and destroy her with depth charges. Loss of 83 crew.
